Seven Holiday Waste Prevention Tips

- 1. Going gift shopping? Take a reusable shopping bag.
- 2. Replant a live Christmas tree or donate it to a school or agency that can.
- 3. Cancel gift catalogs that you don't use. Call the company's toll-free number and ask them to take your name off the list. Teach yourself how to shop online this year.
- 4. Save pieces of gift wrap (open carefully!), bows, ribbons and other decorations that can be packed away for next year.
- 5. Cut up holiday cards for gift tags or new cards or send your cards to the EAD where they will be forwarded to the St. Jude's Ranch for Children.

The children remake the cards into new ones, which they will sell to finance group outings.

6. Buy recycled! Look for items that have recycled content, such as clothing, t-shirts and mugs.



7. Drop off reusable packaging materials (styro foam, pellets, etc.) at your local mailing centers. Call the Plastic Loose fill Products Council at (800) 828-2214 for names of local businesses that reuse them.

National League of Cities Conference a Success

The National League of Cities (NLC) Conference, held at the Los Angeles Convention Center, Nov. 30 – Dec. 4, was a huge success.

Nearly 4,000 municipal government leaders gathered in L.A. for NLC's 76th annual meeting.

The program featured constituency group events, leadership training institutes, and policy committee meetings. Also, the City of Los Angeles proudly showcased over 20 booths for its various departments and activities, including several EAD environmental programs.

Two keynote guest speakers were Kweisi Mfume, chief executive officer of the NAACP, and Clarence Anthony, NLC president and mayor of South Bay, Fla.

Workshop topics included subjects such as workforce development, school safety, race relations, youth

participation, Census 2000, emergency preparedness, and local economies in the global marketplace.

One of the City's forums, the 1999 NLC Futures Report, illustrated a yearlong study focusing on ways to "un-do" racism and improve race relations in America in the 21st century. Tech City focused on some of the newest ways that technology is being put to use in cities. City Showcase highlighted innovative programs from L.A., as well as other U.S.

The conference concluded the year-long

NLC policy that examines and stakes out positions on major federal policy issues affecting local governments. The NLC also voted on its new president for the year 2000: Mayor Bob Knight of Wichita, Kan.
