Remember to Vote on Props 12 and 13

Angeles Los residents have import ant t wo bonds to consider for the March 7 ballot. Proposition 12, a \$2.1 billion parks/ open-space bond and Proposition 13, a \$1.97 billion bond for projects, have both attracted attention from legislators as well as a multitude of groups.

Governor Gray Davis, the California Chamber of Commerce, California Manufacturing Association, California Taxpayers Association and Nature Conservancy of California all continue to make headlines concerning this issue.

Prop 12 is the "Safe

Neighborhood Parks, Clean Water. Clean Air and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2000." This act provides funding to protect the land around lakes, rivers and streams and around the coast to improve water quality and ensure drinking water. Funds are also provided to protect forests and plant trees to improve air quality; to preserve open space and farmland threatened by unplanned development; to protect wildlife habitats; and to repair and improve the safety of state and neighborhood parks.

Prop 13 is the "Safe Drinking Water, Clean Water, Watershed Protection and Flood Protection Bond Act." This act provides funds for a safe drinking water, water quality, flood protection, and water reliability program.

A YES vote means that California could sell bonds for these acts, to be paid off with money appropriated from the State's General Fund, a NO vote means that California could not.

guidelines of the federal authorizing legislation that pertains to the LAURP criteria.

Both the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the USDA Forest Service provide funding for LAURP.

The NRCS is the USDA lead conservation agency that advocates for the well being of the nation's land/soil, water, air, plants and animals. The NRCS partners with private landowners and communities to conserve and sustain our natural resources. These

partners help NRCS set conservation goals, work with people on the land and provide technical assistance. Some of the NRCS partners include conservation districts, state and federal agencies, NRCS Earth Team Volunteers, agricultural and environmental groups, as well as professional societies.

The USDA Forest Service funding comes from the Urban and Community Forestry Program. Urban and Community Forestry is broadly defined as the comprehensive management of trees, forests and related natural

resources in populated areas. These areas include the inner city, the developing fringe of cities and towns and communities of various sizes. The Urban and Community Forestry Program provides for the planning, planting, care of trees, shrubs, groundcover and related natural resources as it affects— and is affected by— human activity.

California ReLeaf 2000 Capacity-Building Grant Awards

California ReLeaf announced the award of 19 grants totaling \$140,000 to community-based urban forestry groups throughout the state. The grants are funded through the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, which has

contracted with the Trust for Public Land, a national land conservation organization, to administer the grant program through California ReLeaf, its urban forestry division.

Funding was awarded for treerelated projects in the categories of Education and Public Awareness, Tree Care and Volunteer Development and Support.

Tree Musketeers of El Segundo, North East Trees, TreePeople and Windsor Square Association of Los Angeles, are four of the local grant recipients. Each of these groups will use their resources to create more livable communities in the Los Angeles area. Tree Musketeers will use grant funds to create a volunteer program partnering adult mentors and youth volunteers in urban forestry activities.

"Urban forestry groups focus their efforts on making citizens and communities more aware of the urban forest and its need for proper maintenance, thus beautifying neighborhoods and improving the

environment," said Genevieve Cross, director of California ReLeaf. "These grants recipients all share a commitment to protect, maintain and enhance our state's urban forest."

KIDS' Guide to Electrical Safety

We encourage you to share this with your family, friends or neighbors. This information may save a life. We are helped in many ways by electricity. It gives us light, television, toast and many more things that we use around the house. But electricity can hurt us if it is not used in a safe way.

Broken Electric Wires are Dangerous

Don't touch or go near any broken electric wires hanging down on the sidewalk or street. The wires can have electricity running through them. Tell everyone to keep away. Tell an older person about the broken wire. Tell the person to telephone emergency 911 to get help right away.

Kite Flying

Flying a kite is fun. But fly it away from electric wires. Only fly your kite in dry weather. Use string without metal in it. Wet string and metal in kites can carry electricity from wires and lightning. You can get hurt. If your kite gets caught in wires, don't try to get it down. Tell an adult to call the Department of Water and Power to take it down. The telephone number is 1-800-342-5397.

Don't Climb into an Electric Station

Places that have lots of wires and electric equipment are very dangerous. They have walls around them with signs that say "DANGER-HIGH VOLTAGE." This means the electricity inside can hurt or kill you. So don't try to get in. If a ball goes over the wall, tell an adult to call the Department of Water and Power.

Bare Wires Can Cause Shocks & Fires

The electric cords at home are covered to keep you from getting hurt. Sometimes the cord is broken and you can see the wires inside. This can cause a fire or give you a shock. Tell an adult about the danger. Tell them to fix the cord.

Water and Electricity don't Mix

Water can carry electricity. People have been shocked in bathtubs. This happens when something plugged into the wall falls into the water. Tell adults to never leave radios, hair dryers, or electric shavers plugged in around bathtubs or sinks. Standing in bare feet on wet floors and using a shaver or hair dryer is also dangerous.
