Long-Term Study Finds Children Developing Lung Deficiencies Due to Air Pollution

An eight-year study, recently completed by the Keck School of Medicine of the University of Southern California, tracked the pulmonary development of over 1,700 school children living among 12 southern California communities, some of which included the greater Los Angeles Basin. Published in the September issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, researchers from the Children's Health Study conducted lung examinations on a yearly basis between 1993 and 2001 to examine and test the children's lung functions.

Conducting the examinations as the study's subjects progressed from the

World Water Monitoring Day is October 18

On the anniversary of the Clean Water Act and the first National Water Monitoring Day (October 18,

2002), the Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA), America's Clean Water Foundation, the International Water Association and many other agencies and non-profits are encouraging citizens around the world to volunteer to monitor the quality of their local streams, lakes, wetlands and coastal waters on October 18.



In 2002, 75,000 people in the United States par-

ticipated in America's Clean Water Foundation's National Monitoring Day by collecting and analyzing water samples. By having a partnership between the International Water Association, US EPA and federal partners, as well as state and interstate agencies, watershed organizations and individuals, World Water Monitoring Day can promote personal stewardship and individual responsibility for the world's water at a global level.

World Water Monitoring Day is intended to become an annual event to involve people throughout the world to establish a baseline for evaluating water quality trends. Volunteers of World Water Monitoring Day will perform four tests to measure dissolved oxygen, pH levels, water clarity, and water temperature. They enter their findings on the World Wide Web. fourth to twelfth grades, the scientists set out to find if a direct correlation existed between the students' lung health measurements and the levels of air pollution monitored in their communities during the same period.

The pollutants that were monitored in the study all derive from vehicle emissions and fossil fuel combustions. The investigation showed that children living in communities where they were exposed to nitrogen dioxide, acid vapor, particulate matter, and carbon emissions exhibited deficits in their lung development over the period of the study. The results indicated clinically low lung function appearing among the participants living in communities with more air pollution. Children with clinically low lung function have less than 80% of the lung function expected for their age. The research indicated that children living in these areas were five times more likely to have low lung function than children living in the communities with less air pollution.

The research team that conducted this study will continue to monitor participants as they mature into their twenties, when lungs reach the end of development. The questions that researchers will pose are if the study's participants will begin to experience respiratory symptoms, and if those who move away from their polluted environment show improvements.







Don't Miss the Total Lunar Eclipse

Wednesday October 27th is a special day for astronomy enthusiasts. Beginning at 5:58 PM the moon will begin to rise into the sky and then into the earth's shadow. The middle and most dramatic point of the eclipse will come around 8:04 PM and should be visible from all of Southern California. The moon will take on a number of colors ranging from golden brown to bright reds and yellows during the

eclipse event.

A full lunar eclipse occurs when the moon's orbit around the earth lines up exactly with the earth's orbit around the sun. This allows the earth's shadow to block the light from the sun that normally hits the moon, and in turn light is refracted through earth's atmosphere resulting in the bright colors during the eclipse. Cloud cover and volcanic activity may limit the ability to 'see' a lunar eclipse.

Astronomy experts will be on hand at the remote Griffith Observatory Satellite during the eclipse event. The group can be found at the northeast corner of Griffith Park near the southern border of the LA Zoo.
