L.A. County Asthma Coalition Observes World Asthma Day 2006

The Asthma Coalition of Los Angeles County is set to present their second annual "World Asthma Day" event on Saturday, May 6, 2006 from 9 am to noon. This event will take place at Hooper Avenue Elementary School located at 1225 East 52nd Street in the City of Los Angeles, and is planned to be a community day of action to unite children, adults, and advocates working to combat asthma in Southern California. This year's theme, "Breathe Clean," emphasizes the link between asthma outcomes and air quality, inside homes, schools and workplaces, as well as outdoors. World Asthma Day is a day of international remembrance held yearly in May. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) takes the lead in outreach this important day.

Los Angeles is home to thousands of people who suffer from asthma and many of these asthma sufferers are children. Research among school children in urban Los Angeles indicates that 14% are likely to have asthma. Asthma significantly impacts our society: it increases the number of emergency room visits, causes more missed school days than any other chronic

EPA Extends Public Comment Period on Lead-Based Paint Proposal

in Los Angeles. For questions, or to update or cancel your free public comment period for the proposed federal rule, "Lead Renovasubscription, call the Environmental tion, Repair and Painting Program" from April 10 to May 25, 2006.

To reduce lead poisonings in children across the country, EPA is proposing new requirements for contractors and construction professionals when working in pre-1978 homes that contain lead-based paint. These requirements include that contractors must be trained in the use of lead-safe work practices, renovators and firms must be certified, providers of renovation training must be accredited, and renovators must follow protective work practice standards.

Although the Consumer Products Safety Commission banned lead-based paint for residential use in 1978, more than 38 million homes in the United States still contain some lead-based paint. Two-thirds of the houses built before 1960 contain lead-based paint. This proposal is one component of a comprehensive program that will also include training and an education and outreach campaign to promote lead-safe work practices. These efforts will help meet the goal of

U.S. EPA Honors Eugene Tseng among Environmental Heroes for 2005

In April, at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's eighth annual Environmental Awards Ceremony in San Francisco, U.S. EPA Regional Administrator Wayne Nastri presented plaques to three dozen organizations and individuals throughout the Pacific Southwest in recognition of their efforts to protect and preserve the environment in 2005.

Among the recipients was Eugene Tseng, consultant and advisor to the Environmental Affairs Department. Eugene was honored by EPA as a leader, innovator, a trusted advisor, and a mentor to all levels of government in the field of solid and hazardous waste, recycling and environmental management for the last 30 years. After Hurricane Katrina, he spent numerous hours over several weeks working with federal, state and local officials in New Orleans to establish procedures and provide technical assistance.

He has traveled all over the world to provide his expertise. Recently, he toured Europe with a delegation from Los Angeles, and consulted on the

emerging use of conversion technology in Europe and in the United States for solid waste conversion into electric power, methanol and other products. Eugene has been a key innovator and technical expert in resolving critically important issues at solid waste facilities. In his notes, Administrator Nastri commented, "Tseng's efforts have benefited the public by making regulatory programs stronger, smarter and safer."

Progress: Alternative Fuel Vehicles, Fuel Economy Programs & Emissions Reduction

During 2005, the City of Los Angeles made significant progress in the use of alternative fuel vehicles (AFVs) and fuel economy programs. The City's active fleet now includes over 2,250 alternative fuel vehicles, with 16 alternative fueling stations and almost 200 electric vehicle charger stations available. AFV use and fuel economy programs resulted in the conservation of over 9.6 million gallons of fossil fuel for the year. The City's AFV fleet and other emission reduction programs eliminated 7.8 million pounds of air pollutants from vehicles for fiscal year 2004/05, at an average cost of 34 cents per pound of pollutant reduced. City employees participating in fuel economy programs such as rideshare and subsidized transit, eliminated over 42 million vehicle miles this year by sharing rides, using public transit or riding or walking to work. These findings are from two annual reports, completed by EAD during the first quarter of 2006. They include 1) a "Clean Cities Annual Report" (i.e., an inventory of City of Los Angeles alternative fuel vehicle use, fuel economy programs, and fuel usage), and 2) the "SCAQMD Subvention Fund Program Annual Report" (i.e., a cost-effectiveness analysis of the City's emission reductions programs funded by State Motor Vehicle Fees). Progress details follow below.

Progress

Alternative Fuel Vehicles

- The City controls a growing fleet of
 2,259 alternative-fuel vehicles
 that
 run on propane, electricity, liquefied
 natural gas, compressed natural gas,
 and hydrogen fuels. Dual fuel and
 gasoline/hybrid models are also counted
 as a part of the alternative fuel fleet.
 The City has the largest municipally owned alternative fuel refuse collection
 fleet in the nation.
- The City owns or is a partner in 16 alternative fuel dispensing stations and almost 200 electrical recharging stations, including 2 state-of-the art fueling facilities for hydrogen vehicles.
- The City conserved approximately 9.6 million gallons of gasoline through alternative fuel use and fuel economy programs in 2005.

Cost-Effective Emission Reductions

- In 2005, the City reduced over
 7.8 million pounds of air pollutant emissions using State Motor Vehicle Fees distributed to the City via the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD).
- This annual reduction was achieved at an average cost of 34 cents per pound of air pollutant reduced.
- The City operates a state-of-the-art traffic flow and signal control system, known as the ATSAC system, resulting in a reduction of more than 7.6 million pounds of air pollutants for 2005. A total of 3287 City intersections are under ATSAC control.
- The City is a designated "Clean City" under the U.S. Department of Energy's Clean Cities Program, a national program that promotes and supports the use of alternative fuels.

Conservation of Vehicle Miles

- City departments participating in the Bicycle Patrol Program traveled over **2.5 million vehicle miles** per year, replacing vehicles that would have been idling during this period or traveling these miles. The City's **Police Department Bicycle Patrols** lead the way by traveling over 2.2 of the 2.5 million vehicle miles during fiscal year 2004/2005.
- City employees participating in the City's **Carpool and Vanpool Rideshare Program**, conserve over **23 million vehicle miles** per year. City employees receiving a subsidy for using public transit or bicycling or walking to work, conserve over **19 million vehicle miles** per year.

The California ReLeaf 2006 Tree-Planting **Grant Program** provides funding for communitybased urban forestry tree planting projects and follow-up maintenance. Preference will be given to the planting of trees on public land that provide greater air quality benefits and to urban forestry projects that provide greater energy conservation benefits. Eligible applicants include incorporated nonprofit organizations and unincorporated community-based groups (with a sponsor) located in California may submit applications. Grants are for costs associated with the purchase and planting of trees, and the maintenance of those trees during the grant period. The minimum award is \$1,000. The maximum award is \$7,500. A cost sharing match of 1:1 is required. In-kind donations and volunteer assistance matching dollars are acceptable. Supporting documentation is required. Federal dollars cannot be used as the reported cost share. Applications must be postmarked on or before May 12, 2006. Faxed or emailed applications will not be accepted. Notification of grant award or denial will be mailed by June 21, 2006. Projects may be initiated upon execution of the grant agreement by the grantee and must be completed by October 12, 2007. Payments are made on a reimbursement basis and will be for actual expenses incurred based on receipts. Grant recipients will be required to use their own operating funds to cover expenses until invoices are reimbursed by the State. A progress report and a final report are required. The final report must be submitted within 30 days of project completion or by November 23, 2007, whichever comes first. http://www.californiareleaf.org/ documents/2006TreePlantingGrantProgram 002. doc/.







condition, creates untold anxiety for patients and family members, reduces physical activity, and has enormous economic ramifications on our health care system. The Asthma Coalition of Los Angeles County plans to bring together asthma prevention and clinical care stakeholders to provide a powerful voice toward addressing the asthma epidemic in Los Angeles County.

In order to bring the asthma crisis to the policy forefront, the Asthma Coalition has developed a "Call to Action," a policy document that provides evidence-based recommendations in six key areas (access to quality health care, indoor and outdoor air quality, health disparities, and strengthened research) to improve asthma outcomes countywide. The World Asthma Day event will mark the official release of this key document. The Coalition's goals for World Asthma Day 2006 are to raise the level of awareness about this widespread disease among policy-makers and to provide useful information to families who are affected by asthma. To this end, they have planned an event that has something for everyone. In addition to presenting the Call to Action, World Asthma Day activities will include a neighborhood march, a health education fair, and a press conference featuring policymakers, environmental experts, and health advocates.
