Greater Los Angeles Auto Show Environmental Cars Make a Big Impact

At this year's Greater Los Angeles Auto Show, held at the Los Angeles Con-

vention Center from January 2 to January 11, 2004, the major automotive manufacturers demonstrated their "green" by the presence of environmentally friendly automobiles in the show. A few trends follow.

While hydrogen fuel cell vehicles are not yet available for sale to the general public, they may prove to be the next big thing if testing goes well. To date, Honda, Ford, General Motors, Mazda, Mercedes Benz, and Nissan have developed and are testing vehicles and evalu-

ating them on public roads using hydrogen fuel cell technology. A single fuel cell consists of a membrane electrode assembly and two flow field plates.



Single cells are combined into a fuel cell stack to produce the desired level of electrical power. Furthering Honda's efforts to make hydrogen power a reality, the company has developed its own fuel cell stack and plans to introduce a version of its FCX fuel cell vehicle powered by the Honda FC Stack beginning in calendar year 2005. In

a fuel cell, hydrogen, which can be obtained from water and fuels such as natural gas, methanol, or petroleum, combines with oxygen from the air electrochemically to produce electricity to power vehicles. Heat and pure water vapor are the only byproducts from the fuel cell's electrochemical reaction.



Hybrid electric vehicles are becoming mainstream as their

sales in the United States in 2004 are expected to exceed 100,000 units, up from 40,000 sold in 2003. Hybrid sales are expected to climb to nearly 350,000 units by 2008 and 415,000 by 2013. Passenger vehicles utilizing hybrid technology are available today from

Honda and Toyota, and the Toyota Prius has been awarded the 2004 Motor Trend Car of the Year. In 2003, the Chevrolet Silverado and the Dodge Ram pickup began commercial fleet-only sales and will be available for retail sales in 2004. New hybrid vehicles coming in 2004 are the Ford Escape, Honda CR-V, and Toyota Highlander. Expected in 2005 will be the Mercury Mariner and the Honda Accord. The Acura MDX and the Ford Futura will arrive in 2006. By 2008 consumers should expect to be able to choose from 28 hybrid vehicles (10 cars and 18 trucks). Hybrids utilize gasoline-electric hybrid technology that never needs plugging in. These vehicles use both gasoline and electricity that is generated on board the vehicle.



The Toyota Prius

Partial Zero Emission Vehicles (PZEVs) are becoming commonplace in the automobile market with about twenty models currently available. Today, PZEV models are being made by BMW, Chrysler, Dodge, Ford, Honda, Mazda, Mitsubishi, Nissan, Subaru, Toyota, Volkswagen and Volvo. The California Air Resources Board defines a PZEV as one that is 90% cleaner than the average 2004 automobile. PZEVs run on normal gasoline but have near-zero evaporative emissions, advanced technology and emission control equipment—all combined not only to keep the air clean but also save fuel costs. PZEVs have come to us as a result of changes to Cali-

fornia's Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) mandate, an integral part of the state's low emission vehicle program crafted in 1990. The ZEV program includes both requirements and incentives for automobile manufactures to introduce low-emission cars into the California market. CITY OF LOS ANGELES RANKS AMONG TOP AIDS WALK TEAMS Congratulations Los Angeles!

Nearly 2.5 MILLION DOLLARS was raised by 25,000 walkers at AIDS Walk Los Angeles to support the services of AIDS Project Los Angeles (APLA) and other AIDS service organizations!

The City of Los Angeles' laudable effort helped to make the Los Angeles AIDS Walk 2003 consistently one of the largest AIDS fundraising events held in Southern California. Thousands of walkers joined the City of Los Angeles on October 19, 2003 to raise \$2.5 million for APLA. The City of Los Angeles ranked fourth out of the participating teams and raised \$34,195. The money raised will help APLA and other service organizations to provide life-sustaining services for over 10,000 men, women, and children living with HIV and AIDS, while also strengthening important education and advocacy programs. According to the Los Angeles County



Department of Health Services, there are over 54,000 people infected with HIV living in Los Angeles County. Over 46,000 people have died of AIDS in Los Angeles alone since its outbreak in the 1980s. This extreme need is why EAD and others are so motivated to raise money and awareness for the cause.

EAD would like to thank all persons who gave so generously to our campaign effort this year. Together we raised \$2,258.33. We couldn't consistently do so well every year without your continued support. We certainly hope we can count on you again during next year's campaign, because as long as there's a need, we're going to do our best.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) SBIR PROGRAM EPA's Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) Program provides financial support to help small science and technology based firms develop new environmental technologies and ready them for commercialization. The program targets research to prevent pollution, reduce water and air pollution, manage solid and hazardous wastes, and improve environmental monitoring - in each case, addressing priorities that are based on the Agency's Strategic Plan. In 2004, EPA will issue four Phase I Solicitations. There will be three special solicitations -Pacific Environmental Problems, Hazardous Waste Minimization and Pollution Prevention - and the regular SBIR Solicitation. Phase 1 opens March 25, 2004. In Phase 1, teams compete for \$10K grants. Up to 50 awards are expected. Areas of interest include, but are not limited to: Energy production and distribution, green chemistry and engineering, conservation of materials and energy, and water quality and quantity. Tribal Preservation Program The purpose of this program is to provide grants for tribes to protect their significant cultural and historic resources. Grant awards are made in five categories: Locating and Identifying Cultural Resources: A) Survey and Inventory of Historic or Significant Places projects are designed to be the first step toward protecting historic places by locating them through a survey. B) Survey of Traditional Skills and Information projects aim to determine the community's cultural needs in transmitting skills and traditions between generations. Preserving a Historic Property: A) Project Planning will be funded to research and plan the physical preservation of a site. B) Repair work on historic structures listed in the National Register of Historic Places will also be funded under this category. Comprehensive and Land-Use Preservation Planning projects will focus on planning for the preservation of previously identified cultural resources. Oral History and Documenting Cultural Traditions projects will focus on preserving culture for future generations. Education and Training for Building a Historic Preservation Program projects will focus on the development of a sustainable preservation program. 

Recycle That Plastic Loose Fill!

Recycling packaging materials not only keeps them out of landfills, but it saves energy and raw materials since new packaging does not have to be created. The Plastic Loose Fill Council was founded in 1991 to promote the reuse of polystyrene loose fill, commonly known as "packing peanuts." The Council was created by the major US manufacturers of polystyrene loose fill packaging. It established the "Peanut Hotline," a national 24-hour consumer hotline, (800) 828-2214, to refer callers to local businesses that accept plastic loose fill for reuse.
