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A RESULT OF THE RECYCLING ACTIVITIES OCCURRING ON
A FORMER LANDFILL SITE, WE HAVE BEEN INSPECTING
THOSE RECYCLING OPERATIONS FOR THE SAME PERIOD OF
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IN MAY 10TH, 2004, THE CITY HAD FILED A COMPLAINT FOR UNFAIR BUSINESS PRACTICES AND NUISANCE IN SUPERIOR COURT. THAT RESULTED IN A STIPULATED AGREEMENT BETWEEN COMMUNITY RECYCLING AND THE CITY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE AND REQUIRED THAT THE BACK AREA, WHERE THE RECYCLING IS GOING ON, TO BE ENCLOSED.

IT WAS THE SAME ORDER. ACTUALLY, IT WAS VERY SIMILAR TO THE SAME -- THE CASE OF AMERICAN WASTE, WHICH YOU ARE FAMILIAR WITH. IN OCTOBER 28TH OF 2004, THE L.E.A. HAD ISSUED A CEASE AND DESIST ORDER REQUIRING A SUBMISSION OF AN APPLICATION FOR A MASTER PERMIT FOR ALL OPERATIONS.

IN NOVEMBER 9TH OF 2006, THE L.E.A. HAD ISSUED THE CEASE AND DESIST ORDER, AND ON NOVEMBER 22ND, 2006, COMMUNITY RECYCLING HAD REQUESTED THE HEARING FOR WHICH WE ARE MEETING

THE CURRENT C.E.Q.A. ISSUES, I WOULD LIKE TO DEFER TO REPRESENTATIVES FROM BUILD AN ENCLOSURE STRUCTURE, A 90,000 SQUARE FOOT ENCLOSURE STRUCTURE.

THIS IS A FULLY ENCLOSED STRUCTURE 3 WITH A STATE OF THE ART BIOFILTERED -- NEGATIVE 4

DRAFT BIOFILTER THAT WILL BE BUILT OVER THE AREA 5

WHERE THE GREEN WASTE, THE SUPERMARKET TRIM AND

CULL, AND WOOD WASTE ARE CURRENTLY PROCESSED. 7
